2024 Year in Review

2024 was a transformative year for Kindling Kiribati. Thanks to the continued support of our generous benefactors, crowdfunding and through grants, we raised over 56,000 AUD to further our mission to empower the women of Kiribati. These funds went directly towards providing business education, loan distribution, and towards our operating costs in-country. This year, we had a record-high loan repayment rate of 94.5%, as well as an increase in loans paid off. We celebrated another milestone with our first ever class to graduate from North Tarawa! This goal aligns with our vison to expand our outreach to even the most remote outlying islands in Kiribati.

The achievements and victories of this year could not have been made possible without all of the support, encouragement, and passion from both our amazing team, and the people who follow alongside our journey. Thank you to everyone who has helped us spark embers of innovation, and we look forward to continuing this journey of growth, collaboration, and dreams together for years to come!

About Us



Kindling Kiribati was started in 2018 with the help of board members Andrea Gooch, JD Borg, Melody Jensen, Brent Thorne, and David Herrmann. Quickly after, Ruth Cross joined the board and provided the support needed in Kiribati to get operations started.

Inception for Kindling Kiribati came while our director, Andrea Gooch, served an LDS mission to Kiribati in 2011. She understood that economies can be most effectively supported through supporting women-run businesses. Kindling Kiribati is a non-profit organization that focuses on the development of small businesses in Kiribati by empowering I-Kiribati women towards self-reliance through business education and access to financial services.

Since 2018, Kindling Kiribati has raised over \$345K AUD through contributions and donations from many different generous donors and grants. The organization has used these funds to provide a total of 440 microloans to I-Kiribati women, leading them closer to financial stability. We believe that through ambition and determination, good and miraculous things are still to come.

Our Theory of Change

Kindling Kiribati's mission is to help Kiribati women build self-reliance and to create global citizens through our internship program. Our mission is two-fold because we know of the transformational power of the program for everyone involved. Women in Kiribati build critical business skills through our courses and many apply for loans to grow or create businesses, empowering them to work toward self-reliance through increased earning potential. Our internship program is an opportunity for students to apply what they are learning in school and share their expertise with communities in Kiribati, all while learning about a new area of the world and gaining cross-cultural understanding.

From the beginning, a pillar of our program has been to provide the next generation opportunities to expand their horizons by working in Kiribati and with the I-Kiribati people.





Tekeraoi!

There is so much success to be shared from 2024. *Tekeraoi* is what is used to say "congratulations" in Kiribati, which we have said to all of our 112 graduates this year. Many took their education further to apply for micro-loans to start their entrepreneurial endeavors. These talented women cover a variety of trades including: sewing, baking, local dancewear, handcrafted jewelry and more. Those wishing to expand the success of their business are able to reapply for additional funding.

Metebwa

"Mauri wear", refers to a type of traditional blouse popular here in Kiribati, that proudly displays a loved ones name across the front of a brightly colored shirt. After completing Kindling Kiribati's business course, graduate Metebwa used her loan to purchase a sewing machine and invest in some base materials to start her own business making mauri wear. She gets new customers by hanging her completed works up by the road outside her home, and the quality of her work brings business by word of mouth. While the majority of her clients are local women who admire her work, recently, she has been getting visits from overseas tourists who want to bring a little bit of Kiribati home with them as well!





Big Wins





Working with the United Nations

In collaboration with UNOPS and the **UNEP** Copenhagen Climate Centre. conducted a Multi-Criteria Cost-Benefit Analysis (MC-CBA) as part of the Australia-Kiribati Climate Security Initiative (AKCSI). This initiative, carried out in September in Tarawa, assessed climate risks and evaluated potential coastal protection measures through a participatory approach. By engaging key stakeholders, the project facilitated data collection, analyzed adaptation solutions, and provided evidence-based recommendations to support climate resilience planning for Kiribati's vulnerable coastal communities.

Data and Technology Upgrades

Thanks to a grant from the YGAP, we were able to update our technology with laptops, tablets, and a database. This new system allows us to collect and report data instantaneously, and maintain our records with a structured database.

Board members Melody Jensen and Patrick Huffcutt traveled to Kiribati to implement and optimize the new technology solutions.

First Copra Co-op Funded

We expanded our loan services with funding for a cooperative of copra agents. The group needed materials to build a processing mill. Copra is the dried, white flesh of coconuts, from which coconut oil can be extracted. We are optimistic about the potential of this project and the potential for other larger-scale loans of this type.
